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FROM OUR CHAIR

In September, we welcomed new chief executive lain Potter to BBNZ. Iain spent the last few months of the year familiarising himself with the basketball community and establishing several priority projects for attention in 2013.

Interim chief executive Murray Strong completed his duties with BBNZ at around the same time. The board wishes to record its gratitude for the work Murray undertook while the search for a permanent chief executive was underway.

2012 was a year of change for Basketball New Zealand, as we consulted on the recommendations of the All of Basketball Plan and then began implementing them. The new tournament calendar was a good example of that work.

"Business as usual" was still a big focus, with the national tournaments all providing fantastic examples of what is great about basketball – passion, fun, excitement, family, friends, competition and camaraderie.

A highlight was the FIBA Oceania U19 Championship for Men and Women, hosted by Porirua in September. This event was very well delivered and earned praise from FIBA officials for the manner in which it was run – congratulations Porirua and BBNZ tournament staff.

The big disappointment of 2012 was the news that basketball is not considered a "high performance" sport in terms of funding from High Performance Sport New Zealand. This decision imposes some serious challenges on us as a truly international sport – but it also reminds us that basketball is our sport and ultimately, it is up to us to take responsibility for its success.

BBNZ is working hard to address the funding issues this decision has raised and we ask for your assistance in making sure we can continue to compete on the international stage.

Financially, the environment remained difficult, but in large part thanks to the diligence of BBNZ staff in keeping costs down and together with a revenue increase, a positive financial result was achieved.

Also, Sport New Zealand continued to offer very welcome support and as a measure of confidence, have confirmed their support through to mid-2015. BBNZ is very appreciative that Sport NZ can see the potential basketball has for New Zealand youth.

We are also appreciative of the support provided by the charitable trusts that have continued to help our sport either directly through BBNZ or through our affiliated members.

During 2013 and beyond, BBNZ aims to develop a commercial strategy that will help build the sport at its grassroots, as well as at the high performance level. This will take time, as we need to demonstrate to prospective commercial partners that we have attractive options for them to partner with.

We need to have our national teams competing within New Zealand regularly, in front of their communities and in the media, offering positive exposure for our sport and our partners. We need to be able to readily communicate with the basketball community and to offer that opportunity to our partners – these will be priorities during 2013.

The NBL provided a positive window into basketball, providing a much-needed profile for our game. BBNZ thanks the NBL board for the positive results achieved in 2012. Similarly, the New Zealand Breakers provided many thrills for the sport, with their nail-biting ANBL win for a second year in a row.

I would like to thank all BBNZ board members for their hard work over the year. The board worked very well together, and to help ensure we continue to do so and improve where we can, we undertook an internal performance review during the year.

Thanks are owed to the BBNZ staff, who has worked hard to keep things moving in an environment, where there was a lot of change and uncertainty. Thanks also to everyone in the associations, who have strongly supported the need to change and the vision contained within the All of Basketball Plan.

I look forward to a very positive few years, as we turn the vision into reality.

NEW ZEALAND TALL BLACKS

Exactly 10 years after their historic run to the FIBA World Championship semifinals at Indianapolis, the national men's team suffered a year to forget, but one that could haunt them for a while.

After failing to reach the London Olympics through the Oceania Championships, the Tall Blacks were obliged to take the scenic route through the lastditch qualifying tournament in Venezuela.

But the campaign got off to a tough start, when captain Kirk Penney and world-class forward Tom Abercrombie both withdrew with injuries. Their absence was always likely to make the challenge even more daunting and so it proved.

The preparation took another hit when China cancelled a tournament that was to be a key part of the Tall Blacks build-up, depriving them of top-class games en route to Caracas.

Under the expert tutelage of coach Nenad Vucinic and captaincy of Mika Vukona, the players took some time to establish new roles without their two stars and by the time they achieved that, it was too late.

A big opening loss to Macedonia put them on the back foot and although they managed to overcome Angola in their second game, creating a three-way tie for two quarterfinal spots, the points differential was never going to work in their favour.



But the programme was not a complete failure – without Penney or Abercrombie, several young players stepped up and showed they were ready for bigger roles in future Tall Blacks teams. The biggest "find" was teenage rookie Tai Webster, who quickly established himself as the starting point guard.

But the performances did not sufficiently impress High Performance Sport NZ, which cut all funding to the team at the end of the year.

With a place at the 2014 FIBA World Championship still guaranteed, the Tall Blacks have the talent and the opportunities to return to the top echelon of world basketball, but must now find another source of funding to take full advantage of that potential.

NEW ZEALAND TALL FERNS

Since the Beijing Olympics and the collapse of the Christchurch Sirens, New Zealand's best women have had to travel to all corners of the globe to keep their basketball dream alive.

Cast your eye down the Ferns roster this year and you'll find players based in Australia, Italy, England, US colleges and, occasionally, at home in New Zealand.

It speaks volumes for their dedication to the game, but doesn't make the task of assembling a competitive national team any easier. Even head coach Kennedy Kereama plies his trade in Australia's most distant city, Perth.

With the Australian Opals still one of the best women's teams in the world – they took Olympic bronze – NZ always face an uphill battle qualifying for major championships out of Oceania and were always destined to go through the back door to reach London.

Presented with a tough pool at the qualifying tournament in Turkey, they found European powerhouse Czech Republic too hot to handle and needed to beat Argentina to progress in the event.



After a physical contest, the Kiwis were still in with a shot in the final seconds, but conceded an offensive rebound off missed free throws that cost them a final chance to win the game.

For some veterans, this could be their last appearance in the black singlet – veteran Kate McMeeken-Ruscoe indicated that she would not be back for 2013 – so this was a disappointing end to some careers.

NATIONAL JUNIOR TEAMS

New Zealand continues to develop many fine junior basketball players that progress into the Tall Blacks and Tall Ferns senior ranks.

But the challenges confronting our junior programmes often mean these players struggle to show their full talents in international competition.

One of the biggest is funding. Because players are expected to pay their own way through the programme, many of our most talented simply cannot afford that expense and drop out.

The other obstacle is Australia. If our teams are to qualify for world championships, they must first overcome our friends from across the Tasman and so far, we haven't been able to achieve that.

This was another year where our age-group teams came up against the might of the Australia talent machine at U19 level and came off second best.

The Emus and Gems arrived in Porirua with rosters that included players who had earlier in the year competed successfully at the world U17 championships.

On the first night, our Junior Tall Blacks and Junior Tall Ferns gave them everything they could handle.

At halftime, the JTBs were locked 36-36 with their Aussie rivals, but were blown away 30-13 in the third quarter.

Again, in Game Three, the Kiwis were ahead 43-42 just before halftime, but went scoreless for five minutes of the third period to fall away.

If anything, the JTFs went even closer to the upset. In the opening game, they led with three minutes remaining, but could not score again and allowed their opponents nine unanswered points for victory.

These performances give the world a glimpse of what our juniors could do with consistent exposure to top-class competition.

Standouts for New Zealand in the series were Junior Tall Blacks captain Reuben Te Rangi, who is currently part of the NZ Breakers development programme, and forward Penina Davidson for the Junior Tall Ferns.

The other standout performances from our junior teams came at the Oceania Pacific Youth Championships near Melbourne, where both the Emerging Junior Tall Blacks and Emerging Junior Tall Ferns lost in the finals to the old foe in green and gold.

FIBA 3x3 CHAMPIONSHIP

Over the past couple of years, FIBA's promotion of 3x3 basketball has become an integral part of the grass roots development programme, as well as providing another pathway to international competition.

Last year, New Zealand led the way in that regard, winning the inaugural youth world championship for men in Italy.

Defending that crown was always likely to prove a tough challenge, with the rest of the world now adapting to the new style of play and also very wary of the threat presented by the Kiwis.

Under coach Anthony Corban, New Zealand began the year by winning the Oceania youth title for men and finishing runners-up to Australian in the women.

Corban then took his men to Spain for the title defence and steered them through to the quarterfinal, with good wins over China and Spain along the way.

In the quarters, they could not overcome world superpower Serbia, who went on to defeat the United States in an overtime final.

The 3x3 format is tailor-made for Kiwis. We often lack the depth to compete at the highest level of the five-player game, but – in the great traditions of No 8 fencing wire – we're adaptable and think beyond the square when presented with a new challenge.

The abbreviated game also offers great potential for participation at all levels, from grass roots to international level, and it's an area Basketball New Zealand intends to grow.

BARTERCARD NATIONAL BASKETBALL LEAGUE

After beginning his coaching career with consecutive NBL titles, all eyes were on Pero Cameron to see if he could three-peat with Wellington Saints.

As the season began, it became clear that this was not the same star-studded Saints roster that had prevailed in past finals and that talent was spread more evenly across the league.

Tall Blacks and NZ Breakers veteran Paul Henare had retired and also entered the coaching ranks with the Hawks, while Cameron's childhood buddy from Northland – Judd Flavell – had recruited well with the resurgent Auckland Pirates.

Manawatu, under American Ryan Weisenberg, were the dark horses, with former Duke captain Nick Horvath leading the way.

The league also welcomed back Harbour Heat from a year's sabbatical and although they finished at the bottom of the table, they provided a visible pathway for the region's young talent into the national league.

NATIONAL TOURNAMENTS

Basketball New Zealand's tournament programme gives the country's best young talent a chance to showcase their talent against their peers and nowhere was that better illustrated this year than the NZ U21 Championships in Porirua.

In one of their final appearances before taking up US college scholarships, Tall Blacks forward Isaac Fotu led his North Harbour team against a Wellington side that included a player many are tipping as an NBA certainty – Steve Adams.

This was a head-to-head battle of two of New Zealand's finest players for the next 15 years, and finished with Adams and his team-mates victorious in a classic encounter.

Another highlight of any tournament calendar is NZ Secondary Schools Championships, which brings more than 50 teams together over four grades in one place each year. This year, our biggest event took place in Nelson.

With defending champions Hutt Valley High School failing to qualify, the girls' competition was wide open. Hamilton Girls High School and Rangitoto College played out perhaps the best game of the tournament in the semifinals, and Hamilton's victory sent through to the final.

There, they accounted for Mt Albert Grammar and coach Tyler Wilkinson added another title to all those she gathered with the now-defunct Church College programme.

In the boys, Tall Blacks sensation Tai Webster led his Westlake Boys High School to the title over defending champions and crosstown rivals Rosmini College in the final. Webster has simply continued the school's proud Tall Black tradition of recent times, joining Kirk Penney, Tom Abercrombie, Jarrod Kenny, older brother Corey Webster and Rob Loe in the national men's team.

Overall, North Harbour continued to dominate national age group titles, capturing five – including both U17 men and women – and finishing runners-up twice.

But the good work being done at Waitakere West resulted in three titles – U19 men, U15 boys and U13 girls – as well as two other runner-up finishes.

Next year (2013) will see some subtle change to the tournament calendar, as Basketball New Zealand raises its U21 age group to an U23 category and tries to re-ignite grass roots basketball with the introduction of a national club championships.



SKYCITY NZ BREAKERS

After their triumph in the 2011 Australian National Basketball League - becoming the first NZ-based team in any code to win a championship across the ditch - the Skycity Breakers faced the challenge of somehow defending their title.

They had to do it without talismanic point guard Paul Henare, the club's longest-serving stalwart, who retired at the end of the season.

They would also have to replace their leading scorer, Kirk Penney, who opted to take up a contract in Spain.

The Breakers also elected not to re-sign Sixth Man of the Year Kevin Braswell, who was still recovering from an Achilles tendon injury suffered during the New Zealand national league.

But Andrej Lemanis' outfit seemed to take these challenges in their stride, picking up American point guard Cedric Jackson and veteran Aussie Daryl Corletto to fill the back court vacancies.

Jackson, who had played briefly in the NBA, was a revelation and desperately unlucky not to win Most Valuable Player honours for the season. He led the league in assists and steals, and was a nightly tripledouble threat.

Veterans CJ Bruton and Dillon Boucher added to their list of titles on both sides of the Tasman, Mika Vukona continued to inspire with his intensity and

energy, and youngsters Tom Abercrombie and Alex Pledger made further strides in their basketball education.

After emerging with the best regular-season record, the Breakers successfully negotiated Townsville Crocs in the semifinals, but Abercrombie suffered an ankle injury that would sideline him for much of the finals and keep him out of international play for the rest of the year.

But with a tense final series against Perth Wildcats locked up at 1-1, the spring-heeled forward, who was MVP of the previous finals, took the court and made a crucial block in the final moments to help preserve a lead and see the Breakers home for another title.

The Breakers continue to do great work in the basketball community, promoting the game to fans, sponsors and media, and offering a career pathway for aspiring professional and international players.

While not a Basketball New Zealand programme, our relationship with the Breakers is a key one for the development of our game in New Zealand.

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting Entity

The financial statements presented are those of Basketball New Zealand Inc. (BBNZ) and its subsidiary companies ("the Group"). BBNZ is an Incorporated Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act, 1908.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice (GAAP). They comply with approved Financial Reporting Standards (FRSs) and Statements of Standard Accounting Practice (SSAPs) as appropriate for entities that qualify for and apply differential reporting concessions.

Differential Reporting

The Group qualifies for differential reporting exemptions as it is not publicly accountable and not large. The Group has taken advantage of all available reporting exemptions.

Measurement Base

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost,

Basis for Preparing Consolidated Financial Statements

Subsidiaries

Subsidiaries are those entities controlled, directly or indirectly, by BBNZ. The financial statements of subsidiaries are included in the consolidated financial statements using the purchase method of consolidation.

Particular Accounting Policies

Trade Receivables

Trade Receivables are stated at estimated realizable value after providing against debts where collection is doubtful. Bad debts are written off during the year in which they are identified.

Inventory

Inventory is stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is based on the first-in, first-out principle and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their condition and location necessary for sale.

Property, Plant & Equipment

All owned items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost and depreciated as outlined below. Initial cost includes the purchase consideration, or fair value in the case of a donated asset and those costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for its intended use. Costs cease to be capitalized when substantially all the activities necessary to bring the asset to the location and condition for its intended use are complete. All feasibility costs are expensed as incurred. Items of property, plant and equipment are written down immediately if impairment in the value of the asset causes its recoverable amount to fall below its carrying amount. The impairment is recognized in the statement of financial performance.



Where an item of property, plant and equipment is disposed of, the gain or loss recognized in the statement of financial performance is calculated as the difference between the net sale price and the carrying amount of the asset.

Depreciation

Depreciation is based on allocating the cost of an asset over its useful economic life.

Depreciation has been charged at the rates recommended by the IRD. The following rates have been used:

Office Furniture & Equipment 9.6% -48% straight line Computer/Equipment 36% -straight line Software 36%-straight line Team Uniforms & Equipment 12%- straight line Trophies 33%- straight line

Leases

Assets acquired by way of finance lease are stated initially at an amount equal to the present value of the future minimum lease payments, and are depreciated as assets. The interest expense component of finance lease payments is recognized in the statement of financial performance using the effective interest rate method.

Payments made under operating leases are recognized in the statement of financial performance on a straightline basis over the term of the lease.

Income

Income from sports betting commission, player registration fees, league income, national teams and tournaments and tours is recognized in the year that the event occurs.

Grants and sponsorships are recognized in revenue once specific conditions attached to a grant or sponsorship has been met. Grants and sponsorships are treated as a liability until such time that the conditions have been met.

Foreign Currencies

Foreign currency transactions are translated to New Zealand Dollars (NZD) at the exchange rates ruling at the dates of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the balance date are translated to NZD at the foreign exchange rate ruling at the date. Foreign exchange differences arising on their translation are recognised in the statement of financial performance.

Goods and Service Tax

All amounts shown are exclusive of Goods and Services Tax (GST), except for Trade Receivables and Accounts Payable that are stated inclusive of GST.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies.

All accounting policies have been applied consistently with the prior year.

New Zealand Basketball Limited, Basketball New Zealand Limited, New Zealand Basketball Development Limited and Basketball New Zealand Development Limited were formed to protect the names in the interest of Basketball New Zealand Inc. These companies did not trade during the 2012 financial year and it is not intended that they will trade in the future.
