# FROM THE CHAIR

2013 was a challenging but largely positive year for Basketball New Zealand.

We started the year with no financial support from High Performance Sport New Zealand (HPSNZ) for the Tall Blacks or Tall Ferns and consequently had to manage our preparation for, and involvement in, the Oceania Series with our own resources. This was a major challenge but we successfully prepared for and staged leg one of the series in New Zealand, the first home game by either the Tall Blacks or Tall Ferns in four years. While losing the series both teams performed admirably and blooded many new players. And we were delighted to be advised at year end that a small amount of funding would be available for the 2014 Tall Blacks campaign from HPSNZ.

The first year of the new tournament calendar was implemented as per the All of Basketball Plan. More resources were invested to help the tournaments become bigger and better than in recent years with live streaming adding a new dimension and audience. A review at the end of the year suggested that the calendar should be kept as is for another year but this will be consulted on again during 2014 with tweaks made as necessary.

The new zone concept, where Associations are encouraged to work together on basketball issues wider than just representative aspects, progressed although we acknowledge there have been issues and stresses. The Board believes that this cooperative concept is important in moving forward and is looking at how it can be further supported. In the meantime over \$150,000 was distributed to Associations by BBNZ for coach development that required multi-Association cooperation – we hope to build on this in the future.

The Pacific Championship's for men and women were held in Porirua at the end of the year – congratulations Porirua for hosting this major FIBA Oceania event and congratulations to the winning Maori mens team.

Financially we made some inroads with Trusts and sponsors and once again we received greater than expected income through TAB sport betting. This, together with the agreed one-off surcharge on tournament fees that assisted us to when the new levy system commences in 2014, and continued financial constraint allowed us to post a Group surplus of \$96,076 for the year. We settled all historical debts relating to our premises making a saving on any future interest due.



The Huddle, an initiative launched at the 2013 AGM to support our national teams, was not as well supported as we hoped but those that did join have enjoyed regular inside information on the teams and a number of other benefits. We urge you all to join – our national teams desperately need your financial support.

The NBL again demonstrated its popularity with their respective regions with very good crowds at round robin games and a high level of regional media support. Similarly the Tall Blacks received considerable media coverage during the Oceania Series – a reminder of how popular they are.

Sport New Zealand has continued to positively support us developing strategies that will harness the popularity of basketball in terms of participation. An early success in this area has been the inaugural Burger King 3x3 National Tour that was launched in December 2013. This event will grow through the next few years of the sponsorship as will 3x3 at the community level.

Many other community focused initiatives have been progressed during 2013 and progress will be reported on at the AGM. There remains much to do but there is much to be positive about.

Looking forward we have begun the process to ensure regular home games for our Tall Blacks and Tall Ferns, we have an array of updated and improved frameworks and resources being produced that will support players, coaches and referees and we have an increasing profile for our sport that spells success for future years.

Thanks to the BBNZ staff who all worked hard to move things forward with limited resources and thanks also to all the Association staff and volunteers who have supported tournaments, events, project teams and their basketball communities.

# FROM THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE

Kia ora koutou

2013 was the year that saw the first pieces of the All of Basketball Plan (AoBP) being rolled out and at the same time consultation began on how best to roll out and develop many other aspects – player, coach and referee frameworks, a new game management and database system, a coach and player talent pathway, school basketball systems, tournaments and 3x3 etc. Thank you to the many that participated so willingly in all this developmental work.

At the same time we had the new tournament calendar to implement as well as the challenge of delivering the first home games involving the Tall Blacks and Tall Ferns in four years on a starting budget of nil. The excitement at the North Shore Event Centre for the games made the stress worthwhile – it was a great occasion and the players showed their appreciation by pushing the world number two Opals and the top 10 Boomers very hard.

We have happily been readmitted to High Performance Sport New Zealand's (HPSNZ) funding schedule – for one year. But HPSNZ are clear that they exist to 'invest in medals not in sport' and this remains a huge challenge to basketball where we are playing a truly global sport. We are not expected to win a medal immediately but we must show we are progressing towards that probability over the next few years if we are to retain any level of funding.

The many changes agreed as part of the AoBP will take a number of years to develop and bed in. Basketball is a sport with huge potential but to realise that potential we must 'play a long game' – make decisions now that will reap rewards in five, ten and twenty years as today's youth become tomorrow's adults. This long game view will require some patience – but it will be worth it. Meantime there are many things we can and are doing now to help re-build our capacity and profile with the Burger King 3x3 National Tour being an example of a new initiative that will grow exponentially in coming years. Similarly we have re-connected with a number of Asian countries to start the process of hosting annual domestic internationals, South Korea being first up in 2014.



I wish to acknowledge our supporters over the past year. Sport New Zealand has been a strong supporter and continue to be so. We also very much appreciate the support from Peak, Molten, Powerade, SAS apparel, Burger King, The Radio Network, NZCT, Lion Foundation, Infinity, Four Winds, Mana Community Grants Foundation, FIBA Oceania and the TAB.

Thanks also to the NZ Basketball Foundation who are doing hugely valuable work on the legacy aspects of our game and are also working with BBNZ on our annual awards programme and planned Tall Blacks and Tall Ferns alumni events.

I would like to acknowledge Steve and Judy Smith for their contributions to FIBA Oceania and welcome David Crocker, a person very familiar with New Zealand basketball to the FIBA Oceania Secretary General role.

And a big thank you to the mostly volunteer basketball community who give their time to help plan and deliver basketball for our communities.

# NEW ZEALAND TALL BLACKS

2013 proved to be a mixed bag for the Tall Blacks and with several senior players unavailable for a variety of reasons, coach Nenad Vucinic took the opportunity to blood new talent and introduce rookies to the national team.

Nearly half of the trialists named for the China tour, in preparation for the FIBA Oceania Championship series against the Australian Boomers, had never played for the Tall Blacks.

The five newcomers were Brook Ruscoe (22), Jack Salt (17), Reuben Te Rangi (18), Izayah Mauriohoo Le'afa (16) and Jordan Ngatai (20). All five had represented New Zealand through the age groups.

Forward Tom Abercrombie joined the team in China after missing trials to pursue his NBA dreams and Mika Vukona was back for another season as captain.

Although losing narrowly to China Vucinic was impressed by his debutants as they showed they could play on the international stage. In particular the Tall Blacks were unlucky to win their second game 62- 63 in the final seconds.

The Tall Blacks recorded a win against Cameroon 63-62 and continued their winning streak with wins against Mississauga Power (Canadian All Star team from Toronto) and Liaoning taking out the Shikoku Basketball Classic in Shenzhen.

At the FIBA Oceania world cup qualifying series the Kiwis made good starts in both games in Auckland and Canberra leading after the first half but couldn't hold on in the second as the shooting stats fell. Guard Cory Webster proved his scoring ability and led the Kiwis with 14 points in the first and 16 points in the second game.

Many young players were introduced to international basketball and the future looks very positive.

2014 is set to be a big year as the Tall Blacks prepare and compete in the FIBA World Cup.

# NEW ZEALAND TALL FERNS

**As the Tall Ferns programme was not funded by High Performance Sport NZ, coach Kennedy Kereama chose to spread his net across the domestic game where the next wave of international prospects are beginning to dominate.**

In April, Kereama returned to Christchurch where his basketball journey began and was encouraged by what he saw at the Women's Basketball Championship (WBC). This saw youngsters and new caps Samara Gallaher (Otago), Kalani Purcell (Waikato), Penina Davidson (Waitakere), Stella Beck (Hutt Valley) and Jess Bygate (Nelson) selected for the Tall Ferns.

Perth based Kate Fielding and United States based Megan Craig made up the seven new caps.

The young inexperienced side had a tough job of qualifying for the 2014 FIBA World Championship against the world number two Opals and basketball superstar Lauren Jackson.

Natalie Taylor the injured incumbent captain joined the team in a non-playing capacity and was forced to watch from the sidelines offering support to the team especially the debutants including youngest sister Kalani.

With Taylor out Kereama had to call upon the experience of guard Micaela Cocks and forward Antonia Edmondson to lead the team as co-captains.

In their first game of the FIBA Oceania Championship series the underdogs showed composure with five unanswered points late in the opening quarter to draw level at 11 all.

However, the Opals opened up a double figure lead stretching it out in the third quarter.

Co-captain Edmondson led the Kiwis with her athleticism and rookies Davidson, Beck, Craig and Purcell also impressed with their enthusiasm on debut.

The second game in Canberra was a carbon copy of the first game in Auckland. A disappointing third quarter hurt the Tall Ferns as the Opals took home the game and sealed their spot at the 2014 FIBA World Championship. Co-captain Edmondson lead from the front to top both teams with a score of 26 points and Cocks of 25 points.

Topping off a remarkable year Purcell jetted off to the United States and made her debut for Hutchinson Community College, while Beck signed a National Letter of Intent for the Saint Mary's basketball team.

At the end of a tough year coach Kereama remains positive with talk of development of local talent.

# NATIONAL JUNIOR TEAMS

**Former Tall Blacks Pero Cameron, Judd Flavell and Mike Fitchett are familiar with playing on the international stage but this time around they are coaching New Zealand’s finest junior players in hope that they too will go on to represent their country at the top level.**

In the first national junior competition of the year the NZ U20 Men missed out on a medal after losing to South Australia in the bronze playoff game. The women weren’t as fortunate finishing without a win and going down by six points in the playoff for seventh/eighth at the Australian U20 State Championships.

Waikato’s Jayden Bezzant finished the Australian U18 State Championships as the top three-point shooter. His achievement was the individual highlight of the week for both the NZ U18 Men and Women who finished with a 3-5 record.

Centre Tai Wynyard was impressive for the NZ U16 Boys featuring in the overall competition stat rankings and finishing second equal in total offensive rebounds and picked up two double doubles. The boys finished fifth with only two losses and six wins. The girls finished with a 3-5 record in eighth place.

The NZ U17 national teams headed across the ditch hopeful of making history. The Kiwis have never toppled Australia to qualify for the world junior championships. The women lost all three games as they couldn’t capitalise on turnovers and while the men lost their first two games, achieved a rare win over Australia at junior level toppling their rivals 66-59 in game three.

Standout performers for 2013 included Waitakere West Auckland’s Tai Wynyard. The teenager who already tops 2m tall has the size, mobility and footwork to go far. Along with his work ethic he is one to look out for in the future and has the potential to progress to the Tall Blacks.

With 3x3 a likely candidate for the Olympic Games as well as a popular participation activity, Basketball New Zealand continues to invest in it's exposure and competitions.

A highlight of the 3x3 calendar was the NZ U17 3x3 Women winning bronze at the Australian Youth Olympic Festival (AYOF). Under the watchful eye of coach Tania Hunter they started in winning style and toppled Australia (green) in their opening game and then defeating Great Britain.

In the bronze medal playoff the New Zealand side faced China for the second time but had the better of their rivals with Gabriella Fotu (North Harbour) and Tessa Boagni (Canterbury) both scoring six points for the win.

Meanwhile, the NZ U17 3x3 Men coached by Anthony Corban found wins harder to come by with a 2-4 record in the preliminary rounds missing out on the medal playoffs.

After an outstanding performance at the U23 National Championship, Gabriella Fotu was named in the NZ U18 3x3 Women's team for the FIBA Youth 3x3 World Championship.

Hunter kept faith with her successful roster by retaining all four players from the AYOF Gabriella Fotu (North Harbour), Pareraukura Gilmartin-Kara (Waikato), Pene Bishop-Paenga (Porirua) and Tessa Boagni (Canterbury).

The girls emerged winless from the competition which wasn't helped when star forward Boagni injured herself in the opening moments of the first game.

Corban decided to select a completely new line-up and Nico Buckrell (Hutt Valley), Finn Delany (Nelson), Josh Howe (North Harbour) and Theo Johnson (Waitakere West Auckland) were welcomed into the team.

The boys achieve a 4-3 record but narrowly missed out on the playoffs. They won fans around the globe for their play and caught the eye of fellow coaches who admired how much heart they played with.

At year end the inaugural Burger King National 3x3 Tour was announced. Burger King have committed to a four year sponsorship and see 3x3 becoming increasingly popular.

# SKYCITY NZ BREAKERS

To win a championship across the ditch is difficult, to win two consecutive titles is unheard of and to win three is unthinkable but that is exactly what the SKYCITY Breakers achieved in 2013.

The Breakers enjoyed a remarkable year becoming minor premiers and becoming only the second team in history after the Sydney Kings to win a three-peat in the Australian National Basketball League.

They completed an outstanding regular season fashioning one of the best records of all time, 24-4 and for the second consecutive season a 13-1 home record.

Retaining the majority of their winning squad minus stalwart Paul Henare who retired at the end of the last season they looked like hot favourites. Arguably the best player in the competition American point guard Cedric Jackson was back on the roster for another season.

Mika Vukona continued to show his intensity and young guns Tom Abercrombie, Corey Webster and Alex Pledger cemented their places in the team.

Coming off a strong performance in game one of the Grand Final Series the Breakers wrapped up the series 2-0 defeating the Perth Wildcats 70-66 in Perth. It was a tight first half but a strong third quarter saw the Breakers stretch the lead to double figures. With the 12,500 capacity crowd behind them the Wildcats made a comeback and narrowed it down to a one-point ball game with 28 seconds to go. The Breakers held on with CJ Bruton having the last say at the three throw line to seal the win.



Jackson was awarded the Larry Sengstock Medal for Grand Final MVP for his efforts with 14 points, six rebounds, five assists and three steals.

The Breakers have now beaten the Wildcats in the semi-final series of 2011 and the grand finals the past two seasons to cement themselves as one of the greatest NBL teams to date.

It was a perfect ending to a season that bid farewell to coach Andrej Lemanis who will take up his new role as the Australian Boomers coach and Dillon Boucher who retired at the end of the season.

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2013

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Reporting Entity

The financial statements presented are those of Basketball New Zealand Inc. (BBNZ) and its subsidiary companies ('the Group'). BBNZ is an Incorporated Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act, 1908.

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting practice (GAAP). They comply with approved Financial Reporting Standards (FRSs) and Statements of Standard Accounting Practice (SSAPs) as appropriate for entities that qualify for and apply differential reporting concessions.

Differential Reporting

The Group qualifies for differential reporting exemptions as it is not publicly accountable and not large. The Group has taken advantage of all available reporting exemptions.

Measurement Base

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost.

Basis for Preparing Consolidated Financial Statements

Subsidiaries

Subsidiaries are those entities controlled, directly or indirectly, by BBNZ. The financial statements of subsidiaries are included in the consolidated financial statements using the purchase method of consolidation.

Particular Accounting Policies

Trade Receivables

Trade Receivables are stated at estimated realizable value after providing against debts where collection is doubtful. Bad debts are written off during the year in which they are identified.

Inventory

Inventory is stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. Cost is based on the first-in, first-out principle and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their condition and location necessary for sale.

Property, Plant & Equipment

All owned items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost and depreciated as outlined below. Initial cost includes the purchase consideration, or fair value in the case of a donated asset and those costs directly attributable to bringing the asset to the location and condition necessary for its intended use. Costs cease to be capitalized when substantially all the activities necessary to bring the asset to the location and condition for its intended use are complete. All feasibility costs are expensed as incurred. Items of property, plant and equipment are written down immediately if impairment in the value of the asset causes its recoverable amount to fall below its carrying amount. The impairment is recognized in the statement of financial performance.





Where an item of property, plant and equipment is disposed of, the gain or loss recognized in the statement of financial performance is calculated as the difference between the net sale price and the carrying amount of the asset.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is based on allocating the cost of an asset over its useful economic life.

Depreciation has been charged at the rates recommended by the IRD. The following rates have been used:

Office Furniture & Equipment	9.6% -48% straight line
Computer/Equipment	36% -straight line
Software	36%-straight line
Team Uniforms & Equipment	12%- straight line
Trophies	33%- straight line

#### Leases

Assets acquired by way of finance lease are stated initially at an amount equal to the present value of the future minimum lease payments, and are depreciated as assets. The interest expense component of finance lease payments is recognized in the statement of financial performance using the effective interest rate method.

Payments made under operating leases are recognized in the statement of financial performance on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

#### Income

Income from sports betting commission, player registration fees, league income, national teams and tournaments and tours is recognized in the year that the event occurs.

Grants and sponsorships are recognized in revenue once specific conditions attached to a grant or sponsorship has been met. Grants and sponsorships are treated as a liability until such time that the conditions have been met.

#### Foreign Currencies

Foreign currency transactions are translated to New Zealand Dollars (NZD) at the exchange rates ruling at the dates of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies at the balance date are translated to NZD at the foreign exchange rate ruling at the date. Foreign exchange differences arising on their translation are recognised in the statement of financial performance.

#### Goods and Service Tax

All amounts shown are exclusive of Goods and Services Tax (GST), except for Trade Receivables and Accounts Payable that are stated inclusive of GST.

#### Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies.

All accounting policies have been applied consistently with the prior year.
