BASKETBALL NEW ZEALAND MESSAGES

FROM OUR CHAIR



The basketball community had a great deal to celebrate in 2016. The sport continued its rise in popularity and many of the initiatives of recent years were further developed and embedded.

In December, a taste of what joining FIBA's Asia Zone will mean for us arrived early, when the Junior Tall Blacks created history by beating Australia to qualify for the 2017 U19 FIBA World Cup - what a thrill! It was heartening to see the basketball community celebrate and widely applaud the achievement of this group of young men, and their coaches and support staff. Their achievement was also noted in the national media and around the basketball world. We must also applaud their schools, Associations and parents - without them there would be little opportunity for the team to prove themselves on the world stage. Their achievement highlights the likelihood of regular World Cup appearances now that FIBA has guided Oceania into the Asia Zone, providing what we believe to be a fairer qualification process.

For our senior teams, 2016 brought both highs and lows. The Tall Blacks and Tall Ferns showed that we have incredible

talent - the Tall Ferns beating world number three Spain just one example. Both of our national teams were given the opportunity to prepare well, with good opposition to test themselves against while on tour. Their pinnacle events were the FIBA Olympic Qualifying Tournaments, where both teams performed commendably, but they could not quite get through this time. Disappointingly, High Performance Sport New Zealand consequently reduced future funding for the Tall Blacks and again provided no funding for the Tall Ferns.

That said, Sport New Zealand continued to look favourably on the participation side of basketball, with the previously announced increase in funding for community sport commencing. This funding increase can, in part, be attributed to the ongoing popularity of basketball, which was underlined by the 2016 New Zealand Secondary School Sports Council data showing participation at secondary school growing by 4% during 2016 and 27% from 2011 to 2016 - more than any other top 10 sport.

This popularity was perhaps best seen through the secondary school qualification process and nationals. More schools entered the qualification process than ever before. We also had the best media coverage we have ever had for the finals, with live streaming and coverage by Māori Television, Glory League, and national and general news channels - plus more than 170,000 social media views of the buzzer beater from the boys' final. Additionally, the Burger King 3x3 Quest Tour continued to grow in popularity and stature.

Our NZME media relationship continued to aid Basketball New Zealand's (BBNZ's) drive to build a much higher profile for all aspects of the game,

particularly with 27 National Basketball League (NBL) games being live-streamed on the New Zealand Herald's basketball page. That exposure has led to a greater media package for the NBL in 2017, with two televised games weekly, as well as more live-streamed games.

Financially we can report a surplus of \$31,442 for the year, thanks to the TAB for a large part of the increased revenue. We must tread carefully though. This surplus, and our modest reserve, will be called on during 2017 as the costs of entering Asia, together with the need to keep moving forward with the many initiatives of recent years, are likely to exceed our current revenue streams. Consequently, we are budgeting a deficit for 2017.

Thanks to the BBNZ staff for such a big year of events and activities. A big thank you, too, to the volunteers and Association staff who contributed to making basketball a positive experience for so many people.

On a personal note I would like to record my thanks to everyone for embracing the changes of the past five years. It has had its challenges, but also its rewards. While I have enjoyed it immensely I am, with regret, stepping down effective from the conclusion of the 2017 AGM as I cannot continue to offer the time necessary to fulfil the role. I will retreat to the sidelines and support from afar, as I watch the continued rise of basketball in New Zealand.

FROM OUR CHIEF EXECUTIVE



Hello Asia! 2016 is the final year of the 'Oceania only' system, yet we leave that behind with our heads held high.

BBNZ ended the year by celebrating a victory over our favourite opponents, Australia, to win a historic place in the FIBA U19 World Cup. The Junior Tall Blacks left it to the very last opportunity, but with cool heads on court and outstanding guidance from the bench, the team made history. This was a very proud moment for not only the basketball community, but also for many New Zealanders who do not usually follow the game.

There is more cause for celebration at the grassroots, where the game continues to attract young participants. Our challenge is to accommodate them, ensure they enjoy their experiences and hopefully encourage them to choose basketball for

life. As a sport we really need to focus on the post-school ages, as well as female participants of all ages. We need more adult participants so that we increase our social influence, as well as our political influence. Political engagement is important for any sport and basketball has traditionally struggled in this regard we all need to play our part here.

Our entry into Asia provides many opportunities, but it will test us as administrators. Our new elite pathway demands greater support to meet FIBA's new plans, as our international body makes their mark globally through the FIBA Continental Cups and the FIBA World Cup.

In the men's game, the new FIBA system requires nations to assemble their teams at least every three months to host internationals and also to tour. Additionally, we might be sending up to eight national youth teams away annually to compete at Oceania, Asia and world levels. Of course, we welcome these opportunities and believe it could provide the experience we need to ambitiously drive the Tall Blacks and Tall Ferns into the global top 12. Funding these high performance aspirations will be more critical than it has ever been.

The funding we receive from the New Zealand Racing Board's TAB revenue continues to propel us. However, that growth in revenue has now eased, with some reduction. We need to make up

any decline in revenue, plus some, to ensure we keep moving forward.

In the commercial space, although the market remains challenging, during 2016 we signed in excess of \$200,000 of additional cash sponsorships for 2017 and 2018.

The boosted profile of the NZ NBL is a major positive and, together with regular internationals across Asia and at home, we are confident additional commercial backers will see the benefits of partnering with basketball. Still, it is clear that people need to experience this new world before being willing to invest in it, so we must have faith that the excitement, passion and inclusiveness of the international game will result in financial benefits over time. FIBA has built the new competition system in the belief that people will come - we must join that belief and step up.

Despite the big challenges ahead, I believe New Zealand basketball is poised for great things. Thank you to the players, their families and supporters, volunteers, and staff and Associations that are part of this community - through our collaboration I'm sure we can continue to see the game go from strength to strength.


U13 participation significantly increased, with a total of 108 teams across three regional championships, compared to 87 teams in 2015.

The 35th NBL took place, with the Wellington Saints winning their ninth championship.





WBC winners, the Alloyfold Canterbury Wildcats, unbeaten during the 2016 season. New Zealand continued to be well represented in the US, with more than 50 men and 70 women signed to US colleges on basketball scholarships (including redshirts). At least four US colleges sent scouts to the New Zealand Secondary Schools National Championships.






New Zealanders could watch more New Zealandbased basketball, with live streaming of 27 NBL games, four full days of the WBC, the 3x3 World Tour Qualifier games in Auckland, two full days for each of the U15, U17, U19 and U23 nationals, and the National Secondary Schools Championships.

Māori Television also televised 24 games of the National Secondary Schools Championships plus the Tall Blacks' games at the Olympic Qualifying Tournament in the Philippines.

BBNZ secured a new major sponsor for the Tall Blacks - **Chinese company Golden Star International Limited** between 2017 and 2019.



Figures from the New Zealand Secondary Sports Council showed basketball as the fastest growing sport among the

Top 10 New Zealand sports,

with a 27% increase in the number of secondary school players between 2011 and 2016.



The Burger King 3x3 Quest Tour took place in 15 locations around the country with a record number of registrations. The winners of the Open Men's division, Team Auckland, travelled to Beijing to compete in the World Tour Masters.

The U18 New Zealand teams finished in the top five in FIBA U18 3x3 World Championships in Kazakhstan (fourth men, fifth women).

BBNZ received a record

\$1.84 million TAB funding.



The Tall Ferns beat world number three Spain, number five Czech Republic, and higher ranked Montenegro and Latvia. The Tall Blacks came third in the Atlas Challenge, with a win over China.

Development of the New Zealand Select teams gave our elite men and women more opportunity to perform on the international stage. The men toured China, while the women played China

The Junior Tall Ferns toured China, plus hosted a home series against Japan in Christchurch. Site Weld Ltd became a sponsor of the team for one year.

250 athletes trialled for the New Zealand U16, U17 and U18 boys' and girls' teams.

BBNZ hosted the first Kiwi talent camp in Australia.

Anti-violence and sexual awareness programmes added to our National Talent Development age group camps.



Five Junior Tall Blacks attended NBA's and FIBA's Basketball Without Borders Camp for Asia. Of these, Quinn Clinton, Sam Waardenburg and Taane Samuels were selected for the Global BWB camp in New Orleans, commencing February 2017.

Ryan Jones became 3x3 FIBA Qualified and attended the FIBA U16 European Championship in Poland.

Matt Bathurst attended the World Atlas Challenge in China and the William Jones Cup in Taiwan.

Three New Zealand referees attended the U18 Oceania Championships in Fiji.

FIBA's Carl Jungebrand ran a FIBA Head Referees' clinic for New Zealand referees.

113 people became accredited Kiwi Hoops coaches and 23 became accredited community coaches.

Tall Blacks Head Coach, Paul Henare, was accepted onto the prestigious HPSNZ Coach Accelerator Programme that commences in 2017.

Six of BBNZ's coaches were accepted onto Sport New Zealand's high profile two-year Performance Coach Advance programme.

Nele Nicovic (Auckland) and Sean Fuller (South Canterbury) continue their FIBA European Coaching



BBNZ worked through the first year of a twoyear media agreement with New Zealand's largest media agency, NZME. Alongside other



communications initiatives, including working closely with basketball writers, the use of NZME's basketball page has assisted in raising the level of basketball exposure across NZME's channels, with a 100% increase in coverage compared to the previous 12 months.



BBNZ signed a deal with DMC Sport to provide a new online shop on the BBNZ website, offering a range of licensed products.

NATIONAL TEAMS



In 2016, the Tall Blacks focused on qualifying for the Olympic Games in Rio. Having missed out on directly qualifying for the Games, after losing to the Australian Boomers in the 2015 FIBA Oceania Series, the Tall Blacks had to attempt qualifying through one of the Olympic Qualifying Tournaments (OQT) in July 2016.

FIBA's new Olympic qualification system was introduced for 2016, with three OQTs held in three different cities around the world, with a qualification spot for the Rio Olympics only given to the three teams that won their respective OQTs.

The Tall Blacks' OQT campaign included the Atlas International Challenge in China and a European tour that included games against the national teams of Iran, Latvia, and Lithuania before the OQT in Manila. The build-up programme involved many challenging games, with the team winning a bronze medal at the Atlas Challenge but later losing all three games in Europe.

Competition in Manila was tough, with France and host nation Philippines in the Tall Blacks' pool. The Tall Blacks achieved their first goal on the Road to Rio with a gutsy and skilful 89-80 win over a determined Philippines team in front of a partisan home crowd, booking a place in the semi-finals.

The Tall Blacks were then left ruing missed opportunities that led to possibly the biggest miss of the tournament - the chance to topple world number five, France, in a fully-fledged FIBA tournament - going down in pool play 66-59 in a tight defensive arm wrestle.

Already outsized and outranked, the Tall Blacks then lost big man Isaac Fotu to injury early in the semi-final, yet still pushed opponents Canada to the brink before bowing out of the tournament 78-72 in an enthralling battle. With this loss, the Tall Blacks lost their chance to qualify for the Rio Olympics, ending their 2016 campaign earlier than originally hoped.











As with the Tall Blacks, the Tall Ferns lost the chance to qualify directly for the Rio Olympics in 2015. As a result, in 2016 they also shifted their sights to the 2016 FIBA OQT in France and its second chance opportunity to qualify for Rio. Of the 12 teams at the qualifying tournament, only the top five would earn the right to compete in Rio. This task became even tougher for the Tall Ferns when they were drawn with heavyweights France (ranked four in the world) and Cuba (13) in their pool.

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Head Coach Kennedy Kereama was fortunate to have the majority of New Zealand's elite players available. Captain Natalie Taylor was unable to play due to becoming a new mother, but the Tall Ferns were able to recall veterans Antonia (Toni) Edmondson, Jillian Harmon and Erin Rooney to their ranks.

A squad of 16 players was juggled over the course of an extensive six-week build-up campaign, including tournaments and friendlies in China, Latvia, Belarus and Spain. From the 10 teams the Tall Ferns faced, nine of them were ranked higher. That did not stop the team from claiming victories against highly ranked Spain (ranked three in the world), Czech Republic (five), Latvia (17), and Montenegro (29). They were also close to taking Belarus (10) and Cuba (13), but narrowly fell to both. The quality games brought out the best of the players with Toni Edmondson, Micaela Cocks, Kalani Purcell, Chevannah Paalvast, Jillian Harmon, Penina Davidson and Deena Franklin all starring in winning performances at one stage or another.

Having provided the parochial home crowd at the OQT with a fright the night before with a high-class first half effort against France (before eventually going down 70-52), the Tall Ferns were desperate to bounce back with a win against Cuba. However, the dream of Rio ended with a foul in the final two seconds of the game, resulting in a heartbreaking 64-62 loss.

While the Tall Ferns did not qualify for the Rio Olympics, there were a number of outstanding performances against world-class teams during the preparation for the OQT, illustrating that we are bridging the gap. The wider squad possesses the physical talent and basketball skills comparable to many of the teams that regularly make the top eight internationally. As they acquire more experience through more international games, and time spent together as a team, BBNZ believes their performances will become more consistent.











In 2016, BBNZ announced the formation of New Zealand Select teams. With the Oceania and Asia Zones merging, resulting in more internationals, there is a need to expose a wider group of players to elite basketball to better prepare our wider talent pool for international demands. There is also a need to give these players an insight into the high performance culture of the Tall Blacks' and Tall Ferns' environments, and the legacy and mana that comes with wearing the black singlet. If these players need to step up to Tall Black and Tall Fern level, they need to be ready.

As a result of positive relationships with China, both the men's and women's New Zealand Select sides gained opportunities against Chinese teams.

The New Zealand Select women's team, a largely New Zealand domiciled team, debuted with a two-test series against China B on home soil. Unfortunately, China B was too strong, but the Select women performed admirably.

The New Zealand Select men's team travelled to China for three games against Montenegro, Cameroon, and the Shenzhen Leopards (Chinese NBL team). These games provided invaluable international experience for the players, going down against Montenegro 83-68, winning against Cameroon 72-70, and losing to the Shenzhen Leopards 73-71 in the final game.







NATIONAL 3X3 TEAMS

The pressure was on the New Zealand U18 men's 3x3 team as they arrived in Astana, Kazakhstan, as the favourites after winning the World Championship title in both 2011 and 2015. The team, coached by Anthony Corban, was again fortunate to have some taller players, including 2015 MVP Tai Wynyard and Samuel Waardenburg.

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The team finished the pool games undefeated, edging Uruguay by one point in the quarter-final (16-15) before being beaten 21-16 in their semi-final by the tournament surprise package, Qatar. They then lost to Italy in the bronze medal match 21-14, finishing the tournament in fourth place. On the upside, Tai Wynyard was named in the All-Tournament Team and Hamish McDonald took out the silver medal in the individual shooting competition.

The New Zealand U18 women's 3x3 team also impressed on the world stage, managing to beat some powerhouse teams to advance through pool play unbeaten. Despite being considerably outsized, the women delivered outstanding performances to triumph over quality opposition including Turkey (seeded four at the tournament) and Spain (five). Unfortunately they fell short at the first play-off hurdle, losing by two points to the Czech Republic, ending the tournament ranked fifth in the world - up from 12th at the previous World Championships.



New Zealand performed with distinction, being the only nation to have both men and women ranked inside the top five at the tournament.

2016 also included the FIBA 3x3 World Championships held in Guangzhou, China in October. This is always a difficult event to win and the New Zealand men's team had an enormous challenge in Pool A, which featured the three teams that stood on the podium in 2014 - reigning champions Oatar, silver medallists Serbia, and bronze medallists Russia. Unfortunately the New Zealand team lost all their pool games, finishing 19th out of 20 teams.

The women's team did not fare much better, winning only one of their pool games and finishing 12th.





NATIONAL JUNIOR TEAMS U16 AND U19

In 2016, BBNZ also introduced the New Zealand Select concept at the U16 age group level, in order to develop a wider squad of players as we aim to become one of the best national teams at all levels in the new FIBA Asia zone. The 10 best players were selected in the New Zealand U16 team to compete at the U16 Australian State Championships, while another 10 were selected in the New Zealand Select U16 team for the MediBank Classic Junior tournament in Melbourne.

The New Zealand U16 boys finished fifth at the eight-day Australian State Championships. The team won seven of their nine games, losing only to the two finalists - Victoria Metro and Victoria Country. The U16 girls finished seventh with a 5-4 win/loss record, a position that reflected their standing in the competition - the tier just outside the top two or three teams.

The FIBA U18¹ Oceania Championships were held in Suva, Fiji in December 2016. Due to a lack of resources, the Junior Tall Blacks prepared for this pinnacle event only in New Zealand, through a 13-month build-up programme. As a result, the Junior Tall Blacks participated in the Hoop Nations Tournament twice, the U23 National Championships, and had a number of local scrimmages to prepare them for the Oceania Championships.

In Suva, the Junior Tall Blacks won their pool games against Samoa and New Caledonia convincingly, 122-35 and 137-22 respectively. The team then moved into the final with a dominant performance against Guam, winning 116-54. Coached by Daryl Cartwright, the team then pulled off a stunning victory in the final, defeating tournament favourites Australia 57-51. This result meant they

became the first New Zealand age group team in history to qualify for a FIBA World Championships - beating our powerful, well-funded rivals made the victory even sweeter. The Junior Tall Blacks now head to Cairo for the FIBA U19 World Cup in July 2017.

The Junior Tall Ferns' 15-month campaign featured some quality events, with an international tour to China to compete in a Four-Nations Tournament, a rare home series against China U19 Women, and taking part in the Hoop Nations Tournament where they claimed the Elite Women's title. In each case the players were forced to compete against better resourced, bigger and faster teams. The strategy against these teams was to compete for every possession, every loose ball, create disruption and then execute to the best of our ability on offense.

After comfortably qualifying for the final the Junior Tall Ferns were unable to overcome Australia at the FIBA Oceania Championships.

Many of the Junior Tall Ferns signed US college scholarships at Division 1 schools, where they will continue their development. This is an encouraging sign for future Tall Ferns' rosters.

NATIONAL LEAGUES AND CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENTS

NATIONAL BASKETBALL LEAGUE

The 2016 National Basketball League (NBL) was the 35th running of the competition, with the Wellington Saints (Saints) claiming their ninth NBL title in their 16th Grand Final appearance, with a 94-82 win over the James Blond Supercity Rangers (Rangers).

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The Final Four weekend was hosted at the home of the SIT Zero Fees Southland Sharks (Sharks), in what is arguably one of the best NBL venues in the country - ILT Stadium in Invercargill.

After defeating the Sharks in front of a sell-out crowd, the Saints were able to back it up in the final against the Rangers. Despite dropping their last four games in the regular season, the Rangers found some form with a win in the second semi-final over tournament favourites Canterbury Rams, who had finished the regular season first equal at the top of the table with the Saints.

Despite the Sharks missing out on the top two, the Invercargill fans showed up in large numbers, with a near sell-out crowd attending the final. The locals showed support for their franchise's best player and 2016 Saints coach, Kevin Braswell, who became the first rookie coach to win a title since Pero Cameron, who did it with the Saints in 2010.



Tai Wesley scored 19 for the Saints, winning back-to-back titles and consecutive finals' MVPs. Torrey Craig added 15, but his major contribution was at the defensive end, managing to hold 2014 MVP Corey Webster to 12 points on 4/18 shooting. Saints' small forward Leon Henry scored a game high 26 points and 13 rebounds, to help claim his fourth title.

The 2016 NBL featured 27 games live-streamed through BBNZ's media partner NZME's *New Zealand Herald* website. There was a strong following that has helped secure further live streaming alongside games that will be televised on Māori Television in 2017.

With an 'All of Basketball' approach in mind, 2016 also saw the first Community Basketball Plans developed with teams, to encourage a coordinated approach to coaching in schools throughout their communities. It was an inspiring first move towards a better connection between high performance and community basketball.





WOMEN'S BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

The 2016 Women's Basketball Championship (WBC) was held over three three-day tournaments - Tauranga in March, Nelson in April and Porirua in May. In the end the Alloyfold Canterbury Wildcats claimed the championship title.

The season opened with 10 teams lining up to contest the championship. The Junior Tall Ferns also featured, using the Tauranga and Nelson events as preparation for their 2016 campaign.

After two rounds, six teams met at the finals in Porirua, with Pool A made up of the Alloyfold Canterbury Wildcats (Wildcats), Waitakere Lady Rangers and Waikato Wizards (Wizards). Pool B comprised Oceana Gold Rush Otago, Auckland Counties Manukau Lady Hawks (Lady Hawks) and Taranaki Thunder. The Plate competition consisted of four teams - the Capital Flyers, the Tauranga City Coasters, Te Tai Tokerau Phoenix, and Nelson Sparks.

The Wildcats remained unbeaten throughout the 2016 WBC campaign, with 14 straight wins, to deservedly claim the title. They produced a slick performance in the final to defeat the Wizards 68-54.



Lori McDaniel, Head Coach of the Wildcats, paid tribute to a number of players after the final. "It is a lot of effort from all the girls, everyone has contributed and Shea Crotty has been a fantastic leader at point guard. Fran Edmondson has done a great job. She is not a traditional type of post player. She's a wriggly, bendy kind of an athlete but it's great to watch. I also want to commend Ashley Gayle on a controlled true posting game today and I'm really proud of how she played".

In the Plate Final, a dominant Capital Flyers lifted the silverware from the Lady Hawks with a 65-35 victory. It was a performance of pace and polish, which demonstrated why they were regarded as one of the form teams in the second half of the season.







NATIONAL BASKETBALL CHAMPIONSHIP

The National Basketball
Championship (NBC) is a
competition designed to find the
best Association-based team in
New Zealand. The competition
has residence-based eligibility
and provides an opportunity
for players to represent their
Association - effectively their
hometown.

In 2016 the NBC moved south from Auckland to Porirua. Unfortunately, the women's competition could not go ahead due to low team registrations, which meant the three-day tournament was held with only seven men's teams competing.

The men's NBC final featured a number of past and present NBL players, including four former Tall Blacks. The finalists - Canterbury Knights (the Knights) and Hutt Valley - both performed at a consistently high level throughout the tournament, dropping just one game each on their way to the title game.

The final lived up to expectations. Canterbury led going into the fourth quarter 65-63, but with 40 seconds remaining they were down by four. Marty Davison (21) hit what initially looked to be a three pointer with a foul, sending the mainly Hutt-supporting crowd into shock. However, a few moments later it became clear that the whistle was, in fact, for Davison stepping out of bounds.



Marques Whippy (22) pushed right until the end for the Knights, only for Brendon Polyblank (15) to put the game out of Canterbury's reach at the free-throw line, seeing Hutt Valley claim the Championship, 92-87. Hutt Valley's Nico Buckrell (27) showed fine shooting form to claim the tournament MVP.



NATIONAL AND REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP TOURNAMENTS

3X3

Following the success of the 2015-16 Burger King 3x3 Quest Tour, the Secondary Schools 3x3 National Slam continued to attract solid entries, totalling 63 in 2016. Held in Auckland at Waitakere's Trusts Arena, the local schools continued to turn out in force.

In the junior section, Westlake Girls' High School defeated Hamilton Girls' High School 11-7 in the girls' grand final. In the boys' final Rongotai College, who had travelled from Wellington, took the trophy home by doing enough to beat Rosmini College 13-8 in a fast-paced encounter.

After finishing runners up in 2015, Hamilton Girls' High School got their hands on the senior girls' 3x3 Slam title by defeating a well-oiled New Plymouth Girls' High School 11-9 in a tense finish. In a repeat of the 2015 senior boys' final, Rangitoto College Blue took on Westlake Boys' High School. In what turned out to be a lop-sided affair, Rangitoto eased their way to a convincing 21-13 win, making it back-to-back 3x3 National Slam titles for the school.

SECONDARY SCHOOLS NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The SAS Sports 'A' and 'AA' Secondary Schools National Championships turned out to be one of the most exciting and heartbreaking tournaments of the 2016 season. Kahawai Productions and Māori Television once again covered the tournament. Twenty-four games were livestreamed on Māori Television's website and then broadcast after the tournament.

As in recent years, the 'A' competition finals were on day four, with the girls up first. 2015 runners up, Opunake High School, came back hungry to get their hands on the 'A' crown again. In the end Waihi College was no match for Opunake's starting five, who put on a scoring exhibition in their 78-46 victory. Waihi's Petra McCowatt fought hard for Waihi (19p/19r) and solidified her place in the tournament team alongside Opunake's Simone Cook (12), Tara Clement (22) and the eventual 'A' girls' tournament MVP, Iritana Hohaia (19).

In the 'A' boys' final, St Kevin's College were back in the grand final after a

year's hiatus, with the local boys' school, Manukura, making it to the final with the home crowd right behind them. The game ebbed and flowed for four quarters until regular time ended at 58-58. It only took one overtime period to crown St Kevin's the 2016 'A' boys' National Champions, sinking Manukura 71-68. Matthew Brien (24), the eventual 'A' competition's MVP, did the damage with 24 points alongside Youheng Peng (20) who muscled past Manukura's Matangirei Hipango (16) and Shaka Riddel-Horua (14).

The 'AA' competition did not disappoint. The girls' final match up pitted pretournament favourites, St Peter's School Cambridge, against underdogs Mt Albert Grammar School (MAGS). Led by Charlisse Leger-Walker (35p/14r) and Kendell Heremaia (17p/10r), St Peter's held MAGS at bay despite everything Trinity Paeu (14) and Sharne Pupuke-Robati (13p/10r) threw at them. St Peter's closed the door on MAGS 68-53, succeeding in their quest to win back-to-back national titles.

Hometown favourites, Palmerston North Boys' High School, kept their dream

alive in the 'AA' boys' competition by making it to the grand final to play titleholders Rangitoto College. A packed Central Energy Trusts Arena Manawatu witnessed an amazing comeback from the Palmerston North team after being down 60-35 at half time.

With less than eight seconds left on the clock, and leading 80-79, Palmerston North had a chance to seal the game, but a missed free throw dropped into eventual 'AA' competition MVP Samuel Waardenberg's (18) hands who got it up court quickly to Cameron Stone (9). Stone threw up a buzzer beater, from two metres behind the three point arc, to stun the home crowd and snatch the 2016 'AA' National Championship title 82-80.

Palmerston North Boys' big man, Callum McRae (33p/17r/2b), was a force to be reckoned with and help from Oscar Oswald (22) brought them back to within touching distance. On Rangitoto's side, Dan Fotu (27p/7r/5a) was a stand out in the final with a great all-round performance.

AGE GROUP AND U13 REGIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

2016 saw Harbour Basketball amass four of the eight age group national titles, clinching the U23 men's, U19 women's, U17 boys' and U15 girls' National Championship titles. Waikato managed to reclaim their U17 girls' crown and grabbed a well-deserved U23 women's title. In the U19 men, Auckland Counties Manukau took home the trophy, while in the U15 boys' tournament Wellington took out the championship.

Increased participation in the U13 age group continued in 2016, with a total of 108 teams across three regional championships (compared to 87 teams in 2015).

A and B grades were again offered to both boys and girls at each tournament. At the Northern Regional Championships, Harbour A claimed both the boys' and girls' A grade titles, Counties Manukau Black secured the boys' B grade trophy and Waitakere West Prems took home the girls' B grade.

At the Central Regional Tournament, Hawke's Bay won both the boys' B grade and girls' A grade titles, Hutt Valley Green won the boys' A grade and Taranaki Country went home with the girls' B grade crown.

The trophies did not make it out of Canterbury in the Southern Regional Championship. Canterbury dominated the boys' grades, with Canterbury Black the A grade champions and Canterbury White B the B grade champions. In the girls' competition, North Canterbury won the A grade and North Canterbury B won the B grade.







NATIONAL ACTIVITIES

ALUMNI

BBNZ hosts annual Alumni events in order to maintain a connection with those players, coaches and staff who have represented New Zealand at the highest level of the game.

Basketball needs the support of all our previous generations but equally owes them the acknowledgement they deserve as representatives of our country. Ninety-two Alumni were hosted at the Fairway Conference Centre before watching the Breakers defeat Illawarra at the North Shore Events Centre.

BURGER KING 3X3 QUEST TOUR

The summer of 2015/16 saw the third Burger King 3x3 Quest Tour visit 15 locations around the country, with 905 games, 1,474 players and 396 teams across eight categories (male and female U14, U16, U18 and Open grades) participating.

Three new locations were added to the Tour - Rotorua, New Plymouth and Invercargill. The stand out events were Christchurch (55 teams and 209 players) and Dunedin (38 teams and 149 players).

Burger King invested in a street poster campaign in all centres on the Tour and NZME provided on-air advertising and promotion through their Flava station.

2016 was the first year where the Tour had 'Quest' status, which resulted in seven eligible winning Open men's teams from around the country participating in a World Tour Qualifier Final in Auckland on 2 April. This event was held at the ASB Stadium, Kohimarama and was live-streamed.

The winning team, Team Auckland, then represented their city at the World Tour Masters in Beijing, China in September. Team Auckland comprised players John Harrison, Rory Fannon, James McLeod, and Karl Noyer, with David Huxford the manager. The first round was cut throat, with four pools of three teams - Team Auckland was knocked out after not winning their pool, with losses to Hamamatsu (Japan) and Wukesong (China).

As 3x3 is BBNZ's summer sport, it spans two calendar years, so late in 2016 preparations were made for the 2016-17 Burger King 3x3 Quest Tour, with four events held in late 2016.

COACH DEVELOPMENT

KIWI HOOPS AND COMMUNITY COACHING COURSES

In 2016, the Kiwi Hoops and community coaching courses and modules continued to be delivered in the regions, with approximately 113 accredited Kiwi Hoops coaches and 23 accredited community coaches completing the courses. BBNZ has been very encouraged by the continued positive response we have received from basketball communities and is delighted with the number of people taking up these community-focused coaching opportunities. 2017 will see the implementation and delivery of the third coaching course in the BBNZ coaching framework - the 'performance' level.

HIGH PERFORMANCE SPORT NEW ZEALAND COACH ACCELERATOR PROGRAMME

Tall Blacks' Head Coach, Paul Henare, was accepted onto the prestigious High Performance Sport New Zealand (HPSNZ) Coach Accelerator Programme that commences in 2017. This is the first time in the eight years since the programme began that a basketball coach has been included. A number of high profile New Zealand coaches, including Steve Hansen (All Blacks) and Mike Hesson (Black Caps), have participated in the two-year programme and have spoken highly of what they learned from the experience and how it shaped their approach to coaching their respective national teams.

SPORT NEW ZEALAND PERFORMANCE COACH ADVANCE PROGRAMME

The Performance Coach Advance (PCA) is a new initiative introduced by Sport New Zealand in 2014 to improve the quality of coaching provided to pre-elite emerging athletes. BBNZ would like to congratulate Jody Cameron (Head Coach, Junior Tall Ferns), Lori McDaniel (Head Coach, New Zealand U17 girls), Morgan Maskell (Assistant Coach, New Zealand U16 boys), Anthony Corban (Head Coach, New Zealand U18 boys 3x3), Brent Matehaere (former Head Coach, Junior Tall Ferns) and James Ballinger (former Assistant Coach, New Zealand U16 girls) who were accepted and completed their first year of the PCA, which is aligned to HPSNZ's Pathway to Podium programme. Sport New Zealand decided to extend the PCA course, so now these coaches will continue their lessons into 2017.

COMMUNITY

2016 was a busy and exciting year for community basketball. New participation programmes released in 2015 were expanded and a range of new initiatives linked to the BBNZ strategy were introduced.

REGIONAL SUPPORT

Improving basketball's delivery infrastructure is one of the key strategic priorities for BBNZ. Part of this is offering better support to our regions, which was a key focus in 2016. To help, two new positions were established - Regional Support Manager and Manager Development and Technology Services.

Several regional projects were supported during the year and a range of new services were developed for Associations. Regional plans were commenced in Manawatu, Auckland and Taranaki. The Capital Zone Basketball Trust was also established in 2016 to provide a shared services model for basketball in the region.

The aim of these regional plans is to bring together key stakeholders including Associations, councils and regional sports trusts, to ensure there is a coordinated approach to delivering, promoting and developing basketball.

As part of new constitutional requirements, the first annual review of Associations was completed, providing an insight into the current strengths and opportunities for Associations across the country. This process also helps identify areas where collaboration between Associations can benefit regions.

ASSOCIATION SERVICES

A range of new services were developed and released in 2016, including the exciting new technology services Glory League and, at the end of the year, the new game management system - The Huddle - powered by SportsTG.

Glory League is a world first player engagement platform that allows players to relive and share their game videos, highlights and statistics while also automating Associations' league management processes. Associations and facilities have been quick to embrace this exciting new technology, with 32 courts installed and operational in 2016.

The Huddle helps Associations manage their day-to-day activities from team registrations and competition management to comprehensive membership databases.

A range of other services for travel, accommodation, business suppliers, player services, equipment, apparel and health services were also available to Associations in 2016.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMMES

The national junior participation programme, Kiwi Hoops, continued its impressive growth in 2016 with more than 10,000 young people participating in the programme in schools across the country.

The network of BBNZ Zone Trainers continued to deliver coach and referee education across the country.

COMMUNITY BASKETBALL FUNDING

BBNZ distributed more than \$160,000 for community development in 2016. This funding programme is supported by New Zealand Community Trust and is targeted towards the delivery of Kiwi Hoops, community coaching and referee development.

In July, the first year of a new four-year funding investment in BBNZ by Sport New Zealand commenced. This increased investment of \$590,000 per annum recognises the progress BBNZ has made in recent years and the huge participation potential of basketball.

COMMUNITY ADVISORY GROUPS

The Community Advisory Group met four times during the year and provided an important link between BBNZ and Associations in the six zones around the country. The Group also worked with BBNZ staff to complete a review of national age group championships.

We would like to acknowledge and thank the Group members - Jill Bolger (Southland), Sara Archdale (Marlborough), Willie Taurima (Porirua), Kevin Fenwick (New Plymouth), Mark Rogers (Tauranga City) and Dave Mackay (ABSL), who finished after four years of service.

A Women's Advisory Group was established in 2016 with the objective of developing a strategy to grow the female game.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

BASKETBALL NEW ZEALAND GROUP FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1. Reporting Entity

Basketball New Zealand is an incorporated society registered under the Incorporated Society Act 1908. Basketball New Zealand is the national body for the sport of basketball in New Zealand. Our role is to develop, grow and promote basketball and participants of the game.

The consolidated financial statements of Basketball New Zealand includes NBL Ltd and Basketball New Zealand Events Ltd ("the Group") and the parent. NBL Ltd and Basketball New Zealand Events Ltd are 100% owned by Basketball New Zealand.

These consolidated financial statements have been approved and were authorised for issue by the Board on 6 April 2017.

2. Statement of Compliance

The Group financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Practice in New Zealand (NZ GAAP). They comply with Public Benefit Entity International Public Sector Accounting Standards (PBE IPSAS) and other applicable financial reporting standards as appropriate that have been authorised for use by the External Reporting Board for Not-For-Profit entities. For the purposes of complying with NZ GAAP, the Group is a public benefit not-for-profit entity and is eligible to apply Tier 2 Not-For-Profit PBE IPSAS on the basis that it does not have public accountability and it is not defined as large.

The Board has elected to report in accordance with Tier 2 Not-For-Profit PBE Accounting Standards and in doing so has taken advantage of all applicable Reduced Disclosure Regime ("RDR") disclosure concessions.

3. Effect of First-time Adoption of PBE Standards on Accounting Policies and Disclosures

This is the first set of financial statements of the Group that is presented in accordance with PBE Standards. The Group has previously reported in accordance with old Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). These have been restated to Not-For-Profit PBE IPSAS – RDR. An explanation of how the transition to Tier 2 Not-For-Profit PBE Accounting Standards has affected the reporting Statement of Comprehensive Revenue and Expenses is provided below.

PBE IPSAS 1 - Presentation of Financial Statements

There are minor differences between PBE IPSAS 1 and the equivalent old GAAP standard. These differences have an effect on disclosure only. The main changes in disclosure resulting from the application of PBE IPSAS 1 are the following:

Receivables from Exchange and Non-exchange Transactions

In the financial statements of the previous financial year, receivables were presented as a single total in the statement of financial position. However, PBE IPSAS 1 requires receivables from non-exchange transactions and receivables from exchange transactions to be presented separately in the statement of financial position. This requirement affects the presentation of both current and comparative receivables figures. Basketballs (sponsorship in kind) have been recognised in the financials for the first time this year and this affects the presentation of both current and comparative sponsorship figures.

Exchange and Non-exchange Transactions

Revenue from Non-exchange Transactions

PBE IPSAS 23 prescribes the financial reporting requirements for revenue arising from non-exchange transactions. There is no equivalent financial reporting standard under old GAAP.

A non-exchange transaction is one in which the Group either receives value from another entity without directly giving approximately equal value in exchange, or gives value to another entity without directly receiving approximately equal value in exchange.

The application of this standard affects the Group's accounting for Sports Betting Commission and Grants.

The layout of comparative figures in the Statement of Financial Performance and Statement of Financial Position for 2015 have been amended accordingly.

Revenue from Exchange Transactions

An exchange transaction is one in which the Group receives assets or services, or has liabilities extinguished, and directly gives approximately equal value (primarily in the form of cash, goods, services, or use of assets) to another entity in exchange.

4. Summary of Accounting Policies

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of these financial statements as set out below have been applied consistently to both years presented in these financial statements, except where listed above.



4.1 Basis of Preparation

These consolidated financial statements have been prepared on the basis of historical cost and under the assumption that the Group will continue to operate as a going concern in the foreseeable future.

4.2 Functional and Presentational Currency

The consolidated financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars (\$), which is the Group's functional currency. All numbers presented have been rounded to the nearest dollar, unless otherwise stated.

4.3 Basis of Consolidation

Controlled entities are all those entities over which the controlling entity has the power to govern the financial and operating policies so as to benefit from its activities. The controlled entities are consolidated from the date on which control is transferred and are de-consolidated from the date that control ceases. In preparing the consolidated financial statements, all inter-entity balances and transactions, and unrealised gains and losses arising within the consolidated entity, are eliminated in full. The accounting policies of the controlled entities are consistent with the policies adopted by the Group and have a 31 December reporting date.

All controlled entities are included in the financial statements of the Group.

4.4 Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Group and revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received. The following specific recognition criteria must be met before revenue is recognised.

REVENUE FROM NON-EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

Grant Revenue

Grant revenue includes grants received from Gaming Trust Funders and Sports New Zealand Group Funding. Grant revenue is recognised when it is received unless there are specific conditions attached that require repayment. In this case, Grant revenue is recognised when specific conditions are met.

Donations

Donations are recognised as revenue upon receipt.

Sponsorship In Kind

Sponsorship in kind includes basketballs and sports apparel, and is recognised in revenue and expenses when the goods are received. Sponsorships in kind are measured at their fair value as at the date of the acquisition, ascertained by reference to the expected cost that would be otherwise incurred by the Group.

Sports Betting Commission

Sports Betting Commission includes sports betting turnover commissions and sports betting profit commissions. Sports betting revenue is recognised on receipt of payment.

REVENUE FROM EXCHANGE TRANSACTIONS

Membership Fees

Fees received in exchange for monthly access to member services for the full membership year is recognised at the time money is received.

Revenue from Providing Services

Revenue from providing services including development programmes (players, coaches and referees) and national tournaments, leagues and events is recognised when the event occurs.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest method.

4.5 Financial Instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the Group becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.



Financial Assets

The Group derecognises a financial asset or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets when the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired or are waived, or the Group has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party; and either:

- · the Group has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset; or
- the Group has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset

Financial assets within the scope of NFP PBE IPSAS 29 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement are classified as financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit, loans and receivables, held-to-maturity investments or available-for-sale financial assets. The classifications of the financial assets are determined at initial recognition.

The categorisation determines subsequent measurement and whether any resulting revenue and expense is recognised in surplus or deficit or in other comprehensive revenue and expenses. The Group's financial assets are classified as either financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit, or loans and receivables. The Group's financial assets include cash and cash equivalents, short-term investments, receivables from non-exchange transactions, receivables from exchange transactions and investments.

All financial assets except for those at fair value through surplus or deficit are subject to review for impairment at least at each reporting date. Financial assets are impaired when there is any objective evidence that a financial asset or group of financial assets is impaired. Different criteria to determine impairment are applied for each category of financial assets, which are described below.

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. After initial recognition, these are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for impairment.

The Group's cash and cash equivalents and receivables from exchange transactions fall into this category of financial instruments.

Impairment of Financial Assets

The Group assesses at the end of each reporting period whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. A financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired and impairment losses are incurred if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset (a 'loss event') and that loss event has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset or the group of financial assets that can be reliably estimated.

For financial assets carried at amortised cost, if there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on loans and receivables carried at amortised cost has been incurred, the amount of the loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. The carrying amount of the asset is reduced through the use of an allowance account. The amount of the loss is recognised in the surplus or deficit for the reporting period.

In determining whether there is any objective evidence of impairment, the Group first assesses whether there is objective evidence of impairment of financial assets that are individually significant, and individually or collectively significant for financial assets that are not individually significant. If the Group determines that there is no objective evidence of impairment for an individually assessed financial asset, it includes the asset in a group of financial assets with similar credit risk characteristics and collectively assesses them for impairment. Assets that are individually assessed for impairment and for which an impairment loss is or continues to be recognised are not included in a collective assessment for impairment.

If in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed by adjusting the allowance account. If the reversal results in the carrying amount exceeding its amortised cost, the amount of the reversal is recognised in surplus or deficit.

Financial Liabilities

The Group's financial liabilities include trade and other creditors (excluding GST and PAYE), employee entitlements, and deferred revenue (in respect to grants and sponsorships whose conditions are yet to be complied with).

All financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value (plus transaction cost for financial liabilities not at fair value through surplus or deficit) and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for financial liabilities at fair value through surplus or deficit.



4.6 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

4.7 Property, Plant, Equipment and Depreciation

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. Where an asset is acquired through a non-exchange transaction, its cost is measured at its fair value as at the date of acquisition.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount of the asset. Gains and losses on disposals are reported net in the surplus or deficit.

The costs of day-to-day servicing of property, plant, and equipment are recognised in the surplus or deficit as they are incurred.

Depreciation is charged on a straight-line basis over the useful life of the asset. The rates are calculated to allocate the cost or valuation of the asset less any estimated residual value over its remaining useful life:

Office furniture and equipment	12%-80.4% Straight Line
Computer equipment	25.2%-48% Straight Line
Team uniforms and equipment	87% Straight Line
Building works	16.67% Straight Line
Motor vehicle	10.2% Straight Line

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and are adjusted if there is a change in the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits or service potential embodied in the asset.

4.8 Leases

Payments on operating lease agreements, where the lessor retains substantially the risk and rewards of ownership of an asset, are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

4.9 Employee Benefits

Wages, Salaries and Annual Leave

Liabilities for wages and salaries and annual leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled within 12 months after the end of the period in which the employee renders the related service are measured based on accrued entitlements at current rates of pay.

4.10 Income Tax

Due to its charitable status, the Group is exempt from income tax.

4.11 Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised exclusive of GST except for receivables and payables, which are stated with the amount of GST included.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is included as part of receivables or payables in the Statement of Financial Position.

Cash flows are included in the Statement of Cash Flows on a gross basis and the GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities, which is recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department is classified as part of operating cash flows.

4.12 Equity

Equity is measured as the difference between total assets and total liabilities. Equity is made up of accumulated comprehensive revenue and expense is the Group's accumulated surplus or deficit since its formation.



5. Significant Accounting Judgements, Estimates and Assumptions

The preparation of the Group consolidated financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

Judgements

In the process of applying the Group's accounting policies, management has made the following judgements, which have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in the consolidated financial statements:

Operating Lease Commitments

The Group has entered into an equipment lease and a lease for their office.

The Group has determined, based on an evaluation of the terms and conditions of the arrangements, such as the lease term not constituting a substantial portion of the economic life of the equipment, that it does not retain all the significant risks and rewards of ownership of these properties and accounts for the contracts as operating leases.

Estimates and Assumptions

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The Group based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the consolidated financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of the Group. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

Useful Lives and Residual Values

The useful lives and residual values of assets are assessed using the following indicators to determine potential future use and value from disposal:

- · The condition of the asset.
- The nature of the asset, its susceptibility and adaptability to changes in technology and processes.
- The nature of the processes in which the asset is deployed.
- · Availability of funding to replace the asset.
- · Changes in the market in relation to the asset.

The estimated useful lives of the asset classes held by the Group are listed in Note 4.7.

6. Investments in Subsidiaries

During the 2004 year BBNZ registered five new companies as wholly-owned subsidiaries. National Basketball League was formed to take over the administration of the Men's First Division Basketball League from and including 2005 following agreements with the Directors and Shareholders of NZ Basketball League Limited.

New Zealand Basketball Limited, Basketball New Zealand Limited, New Zealand Basketball Development Limited and Basketball New Zealand Development Limited were formed to protect the names in the interest of Basketball New Zealand Inc. These companies did not trade during the 2016 financial year and it is not intended that they will trade in the future.


