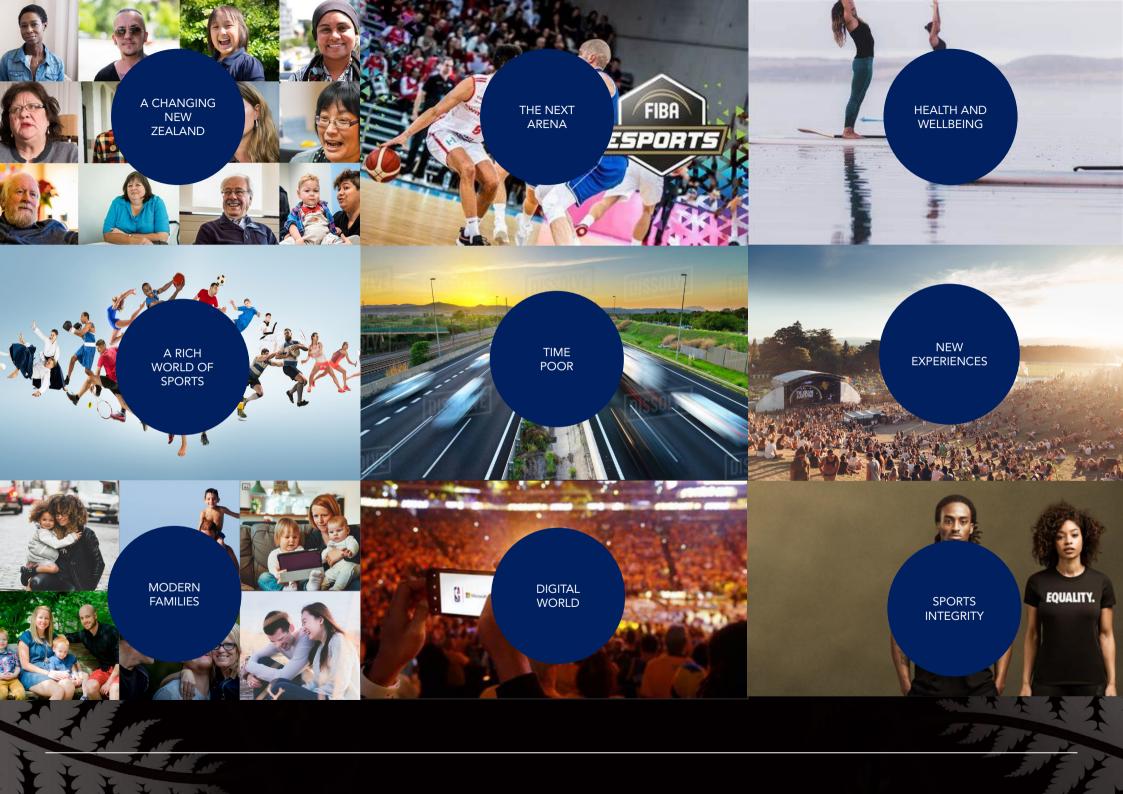

WOMEN & GIRLS BOARD UPDATE

Women and Girls is not just a stand alone pillar; it is integrated, with the goal of it being ingrained in the way we think and work right across the sport - community, high performance and commercial.

High Performance

- The last few years have been frustrating with Covid, impacting the Tall Ferns (TF) programme particularly hard, along with the disruption to the GM of High Performance role, the board acknowledge that there is a lot of work to be caught up on in this space.
- The BBNZ Board are 100% committed to the Tall Ferns programme and share the frustration of many with regard to progress in this area. As such the Tall Ferns are now on the BBNZ board Risk Register, meaning progress is reviewed and discussed regularly at board meetings.
- The launch of Tauihi competition has been a positive step in the right direction, however there is still work to be done around ensuring it is a lucrative and appealing option for our top players to participate in.
- We need to ensure there are clear high performance pathways for our females.

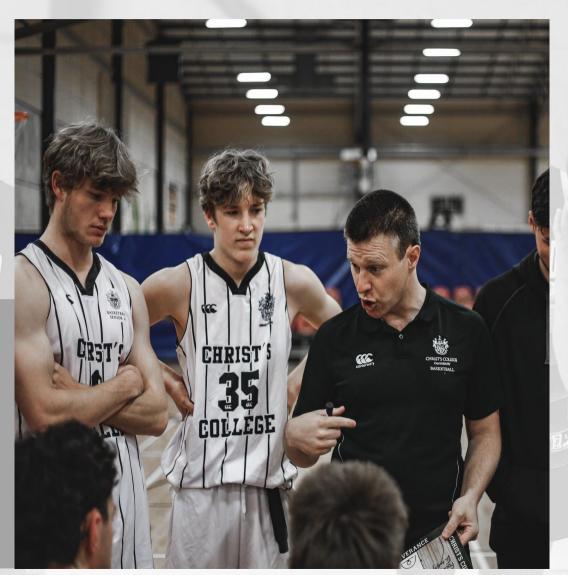

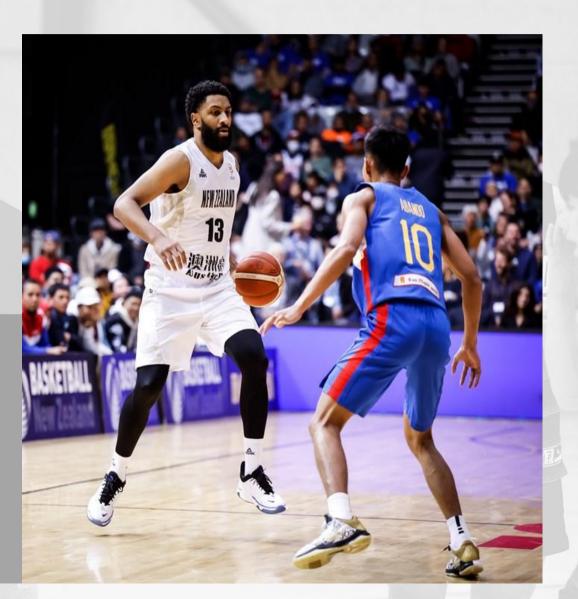

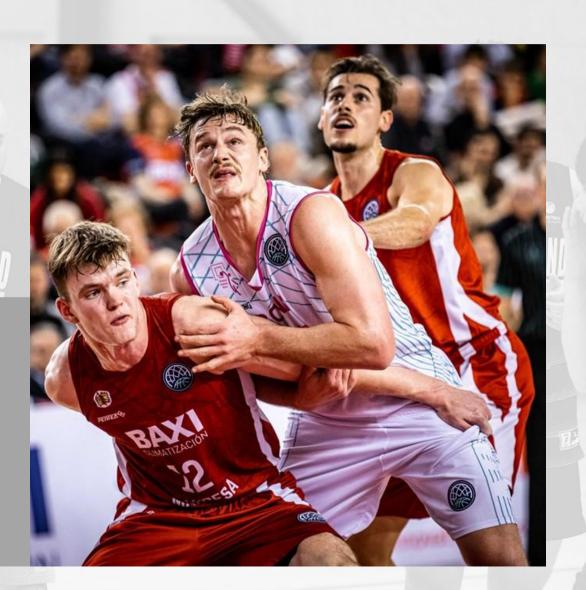

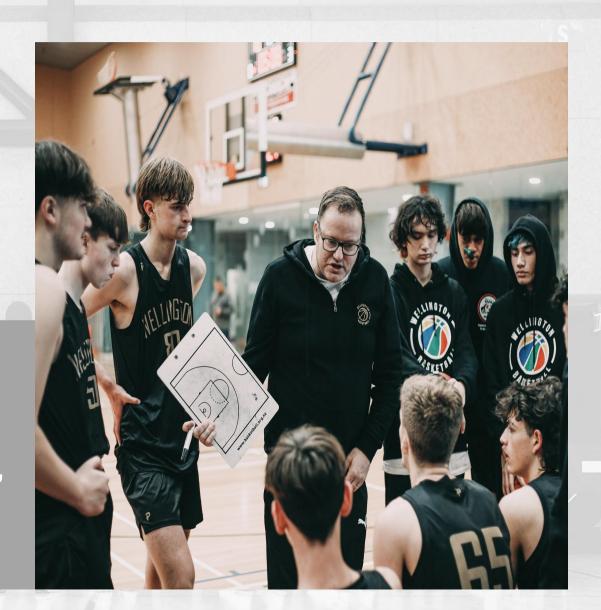

Constitutional change

Motion:

That Rule 10.2 of the Basketball New Zealand Constitution

be amended to read:

10.2 Nomination: Any Affiliated Association or Board Member may nominate a person as a Life Member. Such nomination shall be in writing and shall be delivered to the CEO of BBNZ at least 30 days before the meeting at which it is to be considered.

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New Zealand

Constitutional change

Motion:

That Rule 10.3 of the Basketball New Zealand Constitution be amended to read:

10.3 Appointment: A person may be elected as a life member of BBNZ:

- at an AGM with the prior approval of the Board;
- to be elected as a life member a majority of three quarters
- to be elected, the nominee must be present at the AGM for the citation, to be read by the nominee, but will be removed for the vote;
- d If the vote favours the life membership, then the nominee will be presented a Life Membership pin by the current Chair of the BBNZ Board, immediately concluding the vote.
