





2025 Membership levies

For 2025, we have proposed that an individual membership fee of \$20 per player would replace the fixed levy that is currently in place between Associations and BBNZ. A split payment structure would see half the fee returned to associations and half returned to BBNZ. However, if this is not voted through we propose the 2025 Membership Levies are increased by the 2023 annual CPI inflation rate of 4.7%

Motion:

- a) Support in principle the transition to an individual membership fee of \$20 per member from 2025 alongside the implementation of service level agreements which identify the due dates for payment and association rebates.
- b) 2024 Membership fee plus 4.7%



2025 Membership levies

A; adopt in principle a transition to an individual membership fee from 2025

B; support the formation of a working group to develop the details of the individual fee, including the option of a tiered fee

C; that a SGM is called for September 2024 to finalise the specific individual fee for 2025

D; In the event that no agreement is reached at the SGM the fees for 2025 is set at 2024 plus 4.7%
